M+ Museum









M+ is a museum of visual culture in the West Kowloon Cultural District of Hong Kong. It exhibits twenty-first century visual culture encompassing visual art, design, architecture, and moving image. It opened on 12 November 2021. This beautiful venue offers a new look at Chinese art and design. It has become a "must visit" attraction in Hong Kong. Go and have a look and you won't be disappointed.

Palace Museum









The Hong Kong Palace Museum exhibits artefacts from Beijing's Palace Museum in Hong Kong's West Kowloon Cultural District. Construction began in April 2019 and the museum officially opened on 3 July 2022, in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the handover of Hong Kong. This museum can teach us about our Chinese heritage and history.

Xiqu Centre









The Xiqu Centre is a purpose-built venue for Chinese opera performances (xiqu in Mandarin, pronounced see-ts-ue) and a hub for promoting Cantonese opera and Chinese traditional theatre. The striking seven-storey structure features venues of different style and scale. This is a beautiful building where your family and friends can enjoy an amazing Hong Kong experience.



Trip to Hong Kong Palace Museum

When I arrived outside the Hong Kong Palace Museum, my jaw dropped. It was so huge. The east meets west design looks so modern. The gigantic red door was so traditional and eye-catching.
